Specialization: A specialization is required of all students. Specialization areas include urban

design; land use and infrastructure planning; transportation planning; real estate; historic preservation planning; environmental planning; and an individualized specialization option. For students enrolled in a concurrent

degree, the other field is considered as the specialization.

Internship: Professional experience is highly encouraged prior to completion of the degree

program, although not required.

Prerequisites: Starting with the entering class of Autumn 2015, the MUP program will no

longer require prerequisites. However, a solid understanding of basic

economic principles is essential for all planners. Therefore, students should be aware that they are expected to have a foundation in microeconomics for certain courses and thus should be adequately prepared if they plan to take

such a course.
