GRADUATE CERTIFICATE IN HISTORIC PRESERVATION

The Graduate Certificate in Historic Preservation (GCHP) fulfills the MUP Historic Preservation specialization requirements. It offers students an opportunity to integrate knowledge of historic preservation with their academic disciplines. It prepares students and professionals for careers in historic preservation related to architecture, landscape architecture, urban design, urban planning, history, geography, anthropology, museology and others. Students completing the certificate will be knowledgeable about historic preservation including history, theory, law, and policy, and be able to apply this knowledge in contemporary preservation practice. They will be able to examine historic sites using research methods and prepare preservation plans for a range of historic properties in both domestic and international settings.

The certificate is 18 credits which may overlap with MUP requirements and will appear on your UW transcript.
